Bone Dry Roofing and CertaPro Painters were responsive and very professional. The Friends' expense for this work was slightly more than \$18,000. The house is in good shape to reopen once it is safe to gather. Recent gifts of furniture and appointments will be of interest. For the first time, we have a complete pictorial inventory, with provenance, of the contents of the house. This is the fine work of Claire James and Nan Leathers, longtime hostesses of the house.

Much needful work has been accomplished through the cemetery grounds, and the Greenway construction is very visible as the New Year begins. The amount of ground preparation is impressive and carefully executed.

We've lost many of our Friends in the past year, people who have contributed significantly in a variety of ways. In addition to our tribute to Terry Wingfield in this newsletter, I want to mention Mary Bondurant Warren, who led the first



(Photo by Mark Costantino) With the death of William Terrell "Terry" Wingfield at the age of 92 on August 26, 2021, the Friends of Oconee Hill Cemetery lost a faithful member, ardent supporter and generous donor.

When our organization was launched in 1991, Terry and Joy Wingfield immediately enrolled as charter members. They made it a point to get to know the Friends' founding president, Mary Anne Kenner, telling her that they embraced the stated mission of the fledgling foundation "to build a partnership between Oconee Hill Cemetery and the community by focusing . . . on the cemetery's beauty, historic legacy, facilities, and needs" and assuring her of their ongoing interest and encouragement.

As a trustee and later chair of the Frances Wood Wilson Foundation, of Tucker, Georgia, Terry was in a position to be an exceptionally generous donor to any number of deserving agencies. Terry did not propose donations to organizations in his hometown of Athens without carefully studying the organizations that appealed to him, making certain that their leaders were conscientious in using money contributed toward their causes. After evaluating the programs and leadership of FOHC for several years and becoming convinced that the organization was exceptionally well run and its money always wisely spent, Terry told his friend JoAn Lewis Salloum, then president of FOHC, that our group should present a grant request to the Wilson Foundation.

The Friends board proposed the restoration of the Sexton's House to the Board of Trustees of Oconee Hill at a cost of approximately \$150,000. The goal was to convert this abandoned residence into a gathering space for families and friends following funeral services in the cemetery. At Terry Wingfield's suggestion, we proposed a challenge grant to the Frances Wood Wilson Foundation: \$75,000 from the foundation to be matched by an equal amount raised by the Friends.

Terry presented the good news that our request had been approved at the Friends annual meeting in October 2005. We had until May 15, 2006, to raise \$75,000, and we were delighted and surprised when we were able to raise the necessary amount in a mere six weeks rather than the stipulated six months without holding a single bake sale! One person was not surprised: Terry Wingfield. Having watched FOHC evolve over five years, he said, he'd had full confidence in our ability to raise the money.

Terry carefully watched the restoration of the Sexton's House, occasionally even advising, though never attempting to direct or insist on any aspect of our work. He was our most enthusiastic supporter, and he was as proud as anyone of our accomplishment. He also assisted us in obtaining an additional \$25,000 for landscaping, including walkways and the parking lot around the house.

In 2012, on the eve of Terry's retirement as chair of the Wilson Foundation, FOHC presented another grant request: for a chapel, eventually to be known as the Wingfield Chapel in honor of Terry and his family. This chapel was envisioned as a beautiful, useful, and appropriate structure upon the knoll near the bridge that connects the old and new sections of the cemetery, one of the prettiest and most prominent spots on the grounds. Essentially an outcropping of solid granite, the knoll had never been considered feasible as a site for graves, but it had long been viewed as an ideal setting for a small chapel.

We presented our grant request for this project twice. The first time, Terry was less than enthusiastic about our wish to name the chapel in his honor, and his board followed his lead, offering minimal financial support. The second time, fellow Athenian and Friends member Lawton Stephens urged Terry to allow the Wilson Foundation trustees to consider our proposal as not only a project but also a way to honor a man who had for decades served both the Wilson Foundation and the Friends wisely and well.

Wilson Foundation trustees responded in an unprecedented fashion, awarding FOHC even more money than we had asked for in our grant request. Designed and built by Terry's friend John McLeod, the beautiful stone chapel stands today as a spot for private reflection and spiritual contemplation. Serving also as a place where families can gather for outside funeral services even during inclement weather and as a venue for services, lectures and meetings, the chapel welcomes visitors to the cemetery. As an openair facility, it has been particularly useful throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, providing a safe spot for groups.

Both Terry and Joy loved the chapel, often visiting until Joy's death in 2019. Fittingly, their family saw to it that their appreciation for the Wingfield Chapel and their commitment to the preservation and enhancement of Oconee Hill Cemetery would continue even beyond their lives, designating in their obituaries that contributions in their memory be given either to Athens First United Methodist Church or to the Friends of Oconee Hill Cemetery. As has become a treasured tradition with the Wingfield family, a private memorial service for family was held at the chapel for Terry prior to his public service. We remember and thank Terry Wingfield for his enduring support.
